Mangelsdorf and newly re-installed Treasurer, Alan Horne, we enter our new fiscal year in much better shape financially.

Our annual pledge drive will kick off on Sunday, April 8 with a lunch provided by the Stewardship & Finance Ministry. Solid figures for the mortgage will be provided including a generous donation from the members of the Board.

We've installed a new computer at the greeter's table to log in newcomers and keep communications flowing smoothly. On April 8 we are dedicating new banners in support of Black Lives Matter, LGBTQ Rainbow Coalition and Refugees.

Again this year we are a Black Level sponsor for the Knights Out appeal at West Point and will send a large group of supporters on April 7 to their annual dinner. Last year the Orange County Human Rights Commission presented our own Rev. Chris Antal with an award for his great work, and we will also be represented at their luncheon this year.

We are happy that our building continues to be used by others in our community including The Birch School, The Hudson Valley Folk Guild for concerts, the Psychic Experiences Group, Sound Baths and private birthday parties. Also, the board has decided to hire a part-time administrator to take on office tasks and provide a central point of communication for all our various activities. ## **From our Ministries**

### **Congregational Life**

### **Stewardship and Finance**

Near the end of March, a very exciting event took place. Our treasurer sent a principal payment to the Unitarian Universalist Association that will reduce our building's mortgage to a very manageable amount. Finances need to be an integral part of every organization. For the UUCRT, finances have shown up too often as a burden---a conversation that often pervaded plans and events.

For a tiny congregation to have continued to participate in the world as the members of the UUCRT have, while maintaining and supporting the building that was built with so much optimism, is truly amazing. Some would say miraculous. Some would say unnecessary. To them I can only say that we've done what, to the majority at the time, seemed right and true.

The steadfast generosity of members and friends has made the difference. The pre-fire fiscal soundness of this tiny group, as well as myriad gifts and loans generously offered after our A-frame burned to the ground, made the rebuilding possible, albeit with a mortgage.

Once the doors were opened, members Athena Drewes and Linda Shutts created and managed Longaberger Basket Bingo and Tricky Tray events for the community that provided much needed funds to keep those doors open! Generous pledges and other fundraisers over the years have also contributed and sustained us.

A comprehensive search for a building use partner brought the Birch School to our doors. Their contributions have been invaluable over the years,

and their philosophy of education neatly dovetails with our principles.

In recent years another, and totally unexpected, source of funds has contributed to the UUCRT. Legacy gifts---bequests that come, sadly, with the death of a fond member, have allowed us to continue our programs, provide a space for spiritual growth and a platform for Social Justice.

The mortgage reduction referenced above came primarily from the gift of Anne E. Beck, whose death occurred in January of 2016. Soon a large Chalice will adorn our building's entrance, a visual testimonial to Anne's generosity.

With this large decrease in our monthly outlay, we can return to the simpler focus of balancing our budget and moving forward confidently--knowing that the light at the end of this tunnel is NOT an approaching freight train, but rather rays of sunlight!

### UUCRT to Partner with Veterans Administration on Community Training

The Unitarian Universalist Congregation at Rock Tavern board of trustees voted in March to partner with the Veterans Administration to host a Community Clergy Training Event July 19 at the UUCRT.

Rural veterans in particular have limited health care options, especially for mental health care. Research indicates that mental health stigma is significant in rural America and often inhibits Veterans from seeking needed care. However, many feel that seeking help in rural faith communities will have less negative impact on their reputation within the community and on their military career. Clerics are recognized community leaders and can have a wide influence on public opinion, however, many clergy members have a limited understanding of the challenges common to returning warriors and lack the knowledge necessary to care for Veterans struggling with post-deployment and mental health related issues.

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs National Chaplain Center and Office of Rural Health established a national Community Clergy Training Program (CCTP) to educate faith communities about how they might better use their resources to support Veterans and family members who may otherwise feel isolated, alienated and helpless. The CCTP aims to increase rural clergy's ability to identify and support rural Veterans with reintegration challenges.

### **Help Rev. Chris Count the Nuclear Weapons Money at the UN!**

(Rev. Chris J. Antal has accepted the invitation – below – to be an honorary money counter and invites you to join him in this effort during the United Nations High Level Conference on Nuclear Disarmament from May 10 to 16.)

Dear Rev Antal,

We invite you to join us as an Honorary money counter in Count the Nuclear Weapons Money, and exciting action taking place in New York City from May 10-16 in conjunction with the UN High Level Conference on Nuclear Disarmament.

The Bulletin of Atomic Scientists recently moved the Doomsday Clock to 2 minutes to midnight, indicating the increasing risks of a nuclear conflict. In addition,

the nuclear-armed countries are spending over \$100 billion per year on nuclear weapons and their delivery systems. These are funds that are sorely needed for other economic, social and environmental needs.

From May 14-16, the United Nations will hold its first ever UN High-Level Conference on Nuclear Disarmament to address this issue. Count the Nuclear Weapons Money is being organized in support.

Over seven days and nights from May 10-16 we will count out \$1 trillion (in one million notes each of \$1million value) – which is the nuclear weapons budget for the next 10 years. While counting, we will highlight what this money could instead cover.

The action is part of a global campaign Move the Nuclear Weapons Money, which includes efforts to cut nuclear weapons budgets, encourage divestment from the companies manufacturing nuclear weapons and their delivery systems, and reallocate these budgets and investments to meet economic, social and environmental need - such as ending poverty, protecting the climate, supporting renewable energy, creating jobs, and providing adequate healthcare, housing and education for all.

Honorary money counters are invited to count for 15-30 minutes and use this platform to highlight areas to which they believe the money should instead be allocated.

If you would like to be an Honorary money counter, please register online or email us letting us know on which date and time you would be interested in participating.

We look forward to your reply and hope that you can join us for this exciting action in New York.
